

STRAWBERRIES COMING HERE

Luscious Fruit Makes Appearance—Other Seasonal Lines
The season's first strawberries are expected to arrive in the city this week and retailers are quoted as saying that the prices of 23 cents a basket for the highly perishable fruit, in spite of the fact that growers in the south of the province are experiencing difficulty in getting fruit pickers, an adequate flow of berries is expected to continue for the season.
