Halibut Season Opens But Boats Not
Moving — Extension of Local
Floats Under Consideration

The halibut fishing season will be opened at mid-
night tonight when the fishing becomes legal under
decree of the International Fisheries Commission
but even at this late date the fleet has not moved
to depart for the banks in view of the coast-length tie-
up in protest against the cutback on the ceiling price
by the American Office of Price Administration against halibut
landed at Prince Rupert and Alaska as compared with the
Seattle price. The fleet tie-up
has been the burning question
on the local waterfront through-
out the past week. Local boat
owners and fishermen are, ap-
parently to be guided in their
action by what Seattle and Van-
couver does and are today still
awaiting word from there.
