



SELECTIVE NATIONAL

### IF YOU EMPLOY MALE PERSONS

Have they all complied with the Military Call-Up?

Under an Order signed under authority of the National Selective Service Mobilization Regulations:

1. Every employer of male employees must make an examination of the documents of these employees, and forward advice on those who fail to produce documents showing good

standing under Mobilization Regulations. 2. This examination must be completed by May 1st, 1944.

3. "EMPLOYER" includes industrial and commercial employers, and also farm operators.

4. "MALE EMPLOYEE" includes all male persons working for you, including relatives.

5. A booklet, "EMPLOYERS' GUIDE", has been sent to industrial and commercial employers. A return post card has gone to farm operators. 6. If you employ any male person, and have not

been notified of the survey by booklet or post card, contact the nearest Employment and Selective Service Office and ask for the booklet. 7. Obligation to make the examination rests on

each and every employer of male persons, and employers must act.

8. Penalties are provided for failure to carry out this examination, and for male employees failing to assist by refusal to produce documents.
