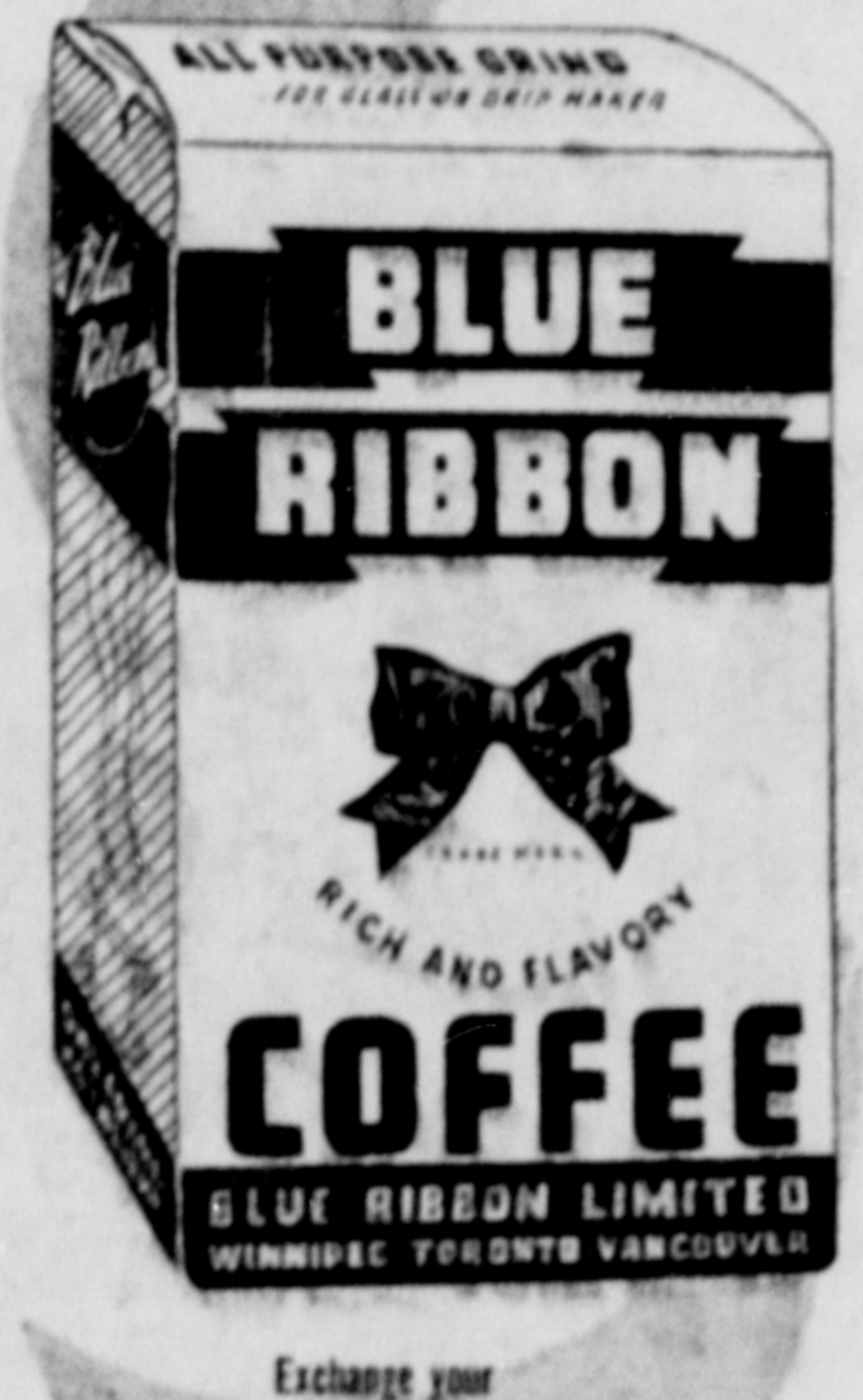

Wartime Prices Prosecution At Prince George

PRINCE GEORGE, March 2—
First prosecution in the Prince
George area for violation of
slaughtering regulations result-
ed in Eugene and Charles Ga-
brielle, trading as the Northwest
Produce Company, being fined
\$75 by Magistrate P. J. Moran.
They slaughtered livestock with-
out obtaining a permit from the
Wartime Prices and Trade Board
and sold some of the meat to
Joe Sing, who operates the
C.N.R. cafe at Prince George.
Sing was fined \$25 for obtain-
ing the meat without surrender-
ing the necessary ration docu-
ments. P. E. Wilson, K.C., pro-
secuted for the Board.

Cold Weather In Bulkley Valley

SMITHERS, March 2 — The
first stretch of winter weather
to be experienced so far during
the present winter is being felt
throughout this district just
now.

Those people who retired on
Sunday night when the tempera-
ture was well above freezing
without making adequate pro-
tection from freezing for motor
car radiators and such like
awoke with regretful surprise on
Monday morning when the ther-
mometer had dropped to near
zero with an uncomfortable
breeze of wind that made it
feel much colder than it really
was.

Curling and hockey opera-
tions had to be suspended dur-
ing the week-end owing to soft
ice but the month went out
and March was ushered in with
a frigid air.

Eight below zero was the coldest
recorded so far during this
spell and while that is not the
coldest it has been during the
winter it promises to be more
sustained.
