Electoral Truce Has a Bearing On Membership But Political Activity Flares Anew With Victory in Sight

LONDON, Dec. 20 (CP)—The structure of party membership in Britain's House of Commons, bolstered by a war-time electoral truce which soon will end, has retained much of its original shape in the 10 years since the nation's voters chose their parliament. 
