103 NOT OUT TORQUAY, England. — "Wicket still standing," was the inscription on a cake presented to Mrs. Frances Sarah Wickett at her 103 birthday celebration. It was the gift of a nephew.

SOCKS STAY SHORT LONDON. — The Board of Trade has decided, despite protests, that men's socks will stay short until the war is over.

UGANDA COTTON FACTORY KAMPALA. — The first cotton factory in Uganda will be established soon. This will introduce into Central Africa a new industry with a potential market of 10 to 12,000,000 Africans and an ultimately higher standard of living.

BIRTH RATE UP STOCKHOLM. — The number of children born in Sweden in 1943 was more than 125,000, the highest since 1921.

WAR WORK TELLS LONDON. — Twice as many pairs of spectacles as before the war are now being worn in Britain according to W. E. Harry, editor of the publication, "Optician." One reason is the high percentage of war workers over 40.

RUBBER RESOURCES EXPAND NEW DELHI. — India's rubber resources are expanding rapidly and continuously. The country's present annual production is about 17,500 tons, which is practically all used in India for war purposes.

MOVED TO SAFETY NEW DELHI. — Plans for the removal of vital war plants from vulnerable areas to safe ones have been almost completed. When Japan entered the war, many of India's war production plants were located in places vulnerable to air attack.
