

MOSCOW CELEBRATES

MOSCOW, April 10—Premier Joseph Stalin, in an order of the day, officially announced the capture of Odessa. The greatest salvo of victory guns yet was fired, 440 guns being used to fire thirtysix rounds.

LONDON, April 10 (CP) — Odessa, the greatest Black Sea port and first major prize of the Nazi invasion of Russia, has been yielded back to the Red Army, Berlin announced today. The evacuation of the naval base was acknowledged by the German High Command which also disclosed that the Russians were striking out in a full-blown offensive to

clear the Crimea and were penetrating the German lines. Mr. Hull's summation was built on the assumption that the United States, Great Britain, Russia and China will co-operate for peace as well as for war. If they do not, Hull said, there was no hope of avoiding another great conflict in the next generation.

ON CZECHOSLOVAKIAN FRONTIER

The Russian Army has now reached the frontier of Czechslovakia and the people of that country have been called upon to rise up against their Nazi aggressors. The Russians, pressing on along a 200 mile front, have drawn further into Bucovina Province of Rumania. They have captured the major prize of Odessa.

ALLIED BOMBERS FAR AFIELD

Allied bombers reached out to within three hundred miles of the Russian front when they attacked war plants in East Prussia and Poland with good effect Saturday night. Royal Air Force mosquitos bombed the munitions centre of Essen and also laid mines in enemy waters. None of the British planes were lost.

GERMANS POUND ANZIO

Action has been stepped up on the Anzio beachhead in Italy. A heavy German artillery barrage caused some damage, it has been admitted. The Aliies replied by shelling an ammunition

INDIA AND BURMA

A small Japanese force which made a thrust at Kohima, sixty miles north of Impahl in Manipur Province of India, was thrown back. There was fighting in the outskirts of Kohima. The situation in Burma, where combined Chinese and American forces are fighting against the Japanese, is little changed,
