### Council Approves Recommendations For Ambulance

City council in special meeting Tuesday night approved recommendations previously approved by the joint ambulance committee regarding operation of the new city ambulance.

Recommendations included the following:

That a fee of \$5 be charged for use of the ambulance, payable at the hospital by incoming cases, and to the driver by outgoing cases.

That the ambulance committee be composed of two members of City Council, two members of the Hospital Board, and a chairman chosen from outside.

That the ambulance committee be empowered to arrange an installment scheme whereby the public can obtain ambulance service on an annual payment. That the city council and the hospital board share equally the surpluses or deficits resulting from operation of the ambulance, providing that not more than \$150 of the driver's salary be charged against operation of the ambulance.


