MRS. GEHRIG IN FOOTBALL

NEW YORK, Oct. 19 (AP)—Sports fans will see a familiar name in a new setting next fall when Mrs. Lou Gehrig, widow of baseball's "most valuable player," puts a new professional football team on the gridiron.

First woman to invade professional football, Mrs. Gehrig is co-owner with Ray Ryan of a New York franchise. She declares she is no traitor to baseball, simply because she couldn't get a wedge into that field anyway.

The former Eleanor Grace Twitchell admits her friends are aghast and amazed at her new venture. Her only supporter is Christy Walsh, "He was Lou's business manager and my friend. He got me into this."

Mrs. Gehrig is strictly a business woman and has no intention of breezing through professional football on the strength of her husband's name. "I know what I'm doing," she says. "I've been a business woman before, though not many people know it. And as for being welcome in professional football because of Lou's money, that's ridiculous. In the first place, all the men I've dealt with could roll over my money with a jeep."

The Gehrig team is now in process of organization. In addition to signing a coach and players, a name must be found and team colors selected.

STATE HOUSING PLAN OPERATING IN S. AFRICA

CAPE TOWN, Oct. 19 (AP)—The state plan for housing in South Africa is explained in a statement issued by the National Housing Commission which gives hope for substantial improvement in the housing situation within the coming year.

The financial agreement between the commission and local authorities together with a government grant of \$8,000,000 (\$36,000,000) means that little difficulty should be experienced in financing the national housing scheme of 12,000 homes in the next 12 months.

Materials remain short and the report emphasizes the Union's first priority is help in winning the war. Every effort is being made to remove shortages, and various purchasing commissions are now at work overseas.

Unanimous agreement regarding national housing schemes was reached at a conference in Pretoria between the National Housing and Planning Commission and the Action Committee of United Municipal Executives on the formula to be applied respecting annual charges to be made against all approved schemes.

For some time municipalities have requested the government to limit local authorities' losses to one and one quarter per cent on capital costs while the government wanted the division of such losses in the ratio of two to one. The new agreed losses vary in proportion to rents charged. The agreement has now to be approved by the government.

In three months ending June 1944, 1,065 houses were completed and 3,361 were being constructed exclusive of figures from big urban centres.
