LONDON, April 22 @ - In spite of flaming incendiary bombs raining down on London, the last few raids have proved Manchester that Hitler's Jerries can't repeat the Great Fire of London. And lit's a group of women who are responsible for keeping the conflagrations under control.

# WAR NEWS

JAP CARGO SHIP SUNK ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN SOUTHWEST PACIFIC - A heavy bomber sank a 1,000-ton Japanese cargo ship west of Hollandia, Dutch New Guinea, while medium bombers continued pounding of nearby sections of the coast.

INVASION BEING REPELLED

KANDY-Japanese reinforcements, including tanks, are being thrown into the invasion of India but are still being knocked back in hard fighting around Impabl and Kohima. An Allied force north of Impahl is reported to have occupied hill positions thirty miles from the city itself and is driving the Japanese steadily back.

WAR ACTION IN POLAND

MOSCOW-The Russians have killed 1,500 Nazis, repelling attacks southeast of Stanislow, and have destroyed sixty-eight tanks. No mention is made of the situation at Sebastapol.

GERMAN COMMAND SHAKEN UP

STOCKHOLM - Swedish press reports that the German command on the Russian front has been shaken up with Field Marshal von Model replacing Field Marshal von Mannstein in command of the Carpathian sector and General Schoerner succeeding von Kleist.

BOMBING IN PACIFIC

WASHINGTON-Allied bombing activity in the Pacific includes another raid on Wake Island, when thirty tons of missiles were dropped, and 55 tons on Rabaul, New Guinea. The Carolines and Marshalls were also bombed.

GENERAL PATTON IN BRITAIN LONDON-The arrival in Britain of General George Patton is associated with the imminence of continental invasion.

SHIP BLAST AT BERGEN

STOCKHOLM - Two hundred are reported dead and 2,000 injured in the explosion of a German munitions ship at Bergen. Nonoegran patriots are said to have been responsible.

MANCHESTER, April 22-Soldiers continue operation of the Manchester gas plan following a strike of gas company employees which threatened to paralyze the city.
