Chlorination Up Again . . .

The city council will have a water chlorination session tomorrow evening, a special meeting having been called to deal with a communication from the federal government inquiring if the city, would be willing to be financially responsible for the operation of a chlorinating plant if the government instals it. The city last year made it plain it would have no part in any water chlorinating plan and there appears to have been nothing since then to cause it to change its mind on the subject so it is to be anticipated that the answer to the latest government proposal will be simply negative. There is no doubt that, views of some of the authorities notwithstanding, the large majority of the people of this city are quite satisfied with the purity and taste of their water and see no necessity or have no desire for any scientific tinkering with it.
