

NEW USES FOR NICKEL MEANT NEW JOBS IN CANADA

AT THE CLOSE of the last war, Nickel was no longer needed to build battleships and artillery. The demand for Canadian Nickel fell off sharply. Soon the Canadian Nickel

mines had to close down.

But the men who managed these properties could foresee possible new markets for Canadian Nickel in the growing automobile, electric, radio, chemical and other industries.
