

Soldiers Are Not Spreading Syphilis and Gonorrhea at Prince Rupert.

VANCOUVER, April 21, --Service men are not spreading venereal diseases in British Columbia, said Dr. Roger G. Knipe, director of the public health unit at Prince Rupert, at a metropolitan health committee meeting here.

There are a large number of service men at Prince Rupert but the venereal disease rate in the armed forces there is only one-third of the ordinary civilian population, said Dr. Knipe.

Prince Rupert had a venereal disease rate of seventeen out of every 1000 civilians which was three times the proportion recorded by armed forces medical officers.
