WOMAN HOLDS UNIQUE POST

Maj. Patricia Curtis, Only Woman Lawyer in C.W.A.C., Now Assistant Judge Advocate-General.

OTTAWA, April 21 (C) — Maj. Patricia Curtis of New Westminster, B.C., is the only woman lawyer in Canada's army. She recently was appointed assistant judge advocate-general at Defence Headquarters here.

Tall and slender, with short curly brown hair lightly touched with grey, she works over legal details of the army. Although she is a member of the Canadian Women's Army Corps, her work is with the regular army, not distinctively with the C.W.A.C.

The C.W.A.C. has no formal enlistment category of "lawyer" but there was no hesitation about letting Mrs. Curtis continue her chosen work when she enlisted in February, 1942.

Her first post was at Corps headquarters in Ottawa. From there she transferred to the office of the Master-General of the Ordnance and in December went overseas for training. On her return to Canada she was assigned to the office of the judge advocate-general at Defence headquarters in Ottawa.

Her 18-months service ribbon, with silver maple leaf for service overseas, symbolizes the hard work she has put into her job, which allows her little time for private postwar plans. She has been quoted as preferring to retire to a South Seas island but she admits that in her saner moments she knows she will "just go back to my law practice in New Westminster."
