McEwen Charges
Govt. "Leniency"

Criticism of the recent action
of the Department of Justice
in releasing from internment
Joseph Farr and John Lorimer,
lieutenants of Adrian Arcand,
self-styled "fuehrer" of Canada,
was expressed this morning by
Tom McEwen, provincial organ-
izer of the Labor-Progressive
party, on his arrival in the city
from Vancouver.

"There is no justification for
the release of these men when
Canadian boys are fighting to
suppress the thing that they rep-
resent," he asserted.

He branded as "foolish leni-
ency" the Justice Minister's re-
lease of Farr and Lorimer and
some 300 others of similar polit-
ical leanings on the grounds
that they were no longer harm-
ful.

"In taking that attitude the
department is guilty of the same
complicity that the govern-
ment is trying to eliminate
throughout the country — the
idea that the war is already
won," he charged.

"Those men can still be dan-
gerous."

The government's conscription
policy was termed "vaccinating"
by Mr. McEwen.

"The government should en-
force conscription to the fullest
extent," he claimed. "There
should be no distinction be-
tween men enlisted for over-
seas service and men conscript-
ed to stay at home." There
should be no need for individuals
to make a choice in so serious
a matter when the government
is supposed to be committed to
an all-out war effort.

Mr. McEwen will conduct a
series of speeches in the city
and district following the Labo-
r Progressive federal nominations
conference to be held on Sunday.

Jimmy Cagney has one of
the most engaging starring roles
of his career in "Johnny Come
Lately" which comes next Mon-

were once hers, he goes blithely
on his way to find romance and
adventure on whatever road he
chooses.
