Weapons of Victory" showing how Britain shared the secrets of her inventions and provided immense quantities of gasoline and oil; all results of research in submarine and naval radio-location devices, barrage balloons, hospital facilities, landing fields, aircraft, weapons; some 200,000 jettisonable gasoline tanks for U. S. planes, steel landing mats for emergency airfields; designs for all power-operated gun turrets. These last three were British inventions. One in nine of Britain's population served in the armed forces and out of the casualties which the Empire had so far sustained, the British share had been two-thirds. Thus Mr. Stettinius paid tribute to the greatness of the British contribution.

A new member was welcomed to the chapter and another elected to membership next month.

November meeting will be held at the home of Mrs. A. E. Wood, 432 Fourth Ave. E., when there will be a speaker in connection with "Better Parenthood Week." The drawing for the raffle will also take place then.
