The Canadian game of softball was introduced to a Belgian town for the first time when two teams from a Canadian Army bridge company staged a sports meet under a warm fall sun before moving "up the line."

The winning team—the score was 4-1—received a great ovation from hundreds of Belgian spectators—not because the townspeople understood what it was all about but because the winners wore the borrowed sweaters of the town soccer club and called themselves the "Belgium" team.

Included in the "Belgium" line-up were Pte. N. Jones of Hamilton, Ont., who pitched, Sgts. F. Speck of Kirkland Lake, Ont., and J. H. Atherton of Toronto, and Ptes. J. W. Crowe, Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., and D. P. Armstrong of Sinclair, Man. Among the losing team were Sgt. W. D. Hannah, Toronto, Cpl. Ken Reardon, Winnipeg, Ptes. J. M. Freve, Mattawa, Ont., and Spr. I. Napolsky of Halifax, Pte. J. E. Stone of Cranbrook, Ont. Swirla also won the biscuit race. The heavies from the work shops, including Sgt. H. Sparrow of Winnipeg, Cpl. C. W. O. O'Brien of Moncton, N.B., and Ptes. G. R. Clark, Provost, Alta., and A. I. Boyce, Blenheim, Ont., won the tug-of-war competition.
