GEO. BROCHU
PASSES AWAY

Death Removes Another of
Prince Rupert's Pioneer Citi-
zens.

George Brochu, another old
timer of Prince Rupert, has
passed away. He died at 2
o'clock yesterday morning in
Vancouver where he has been
residing for the past year with
his son, George Brochu. He had
been in failing health for about
a year.

Mr. Brochu was a real pion-
eer of the north, having been
in Dawson, where he was en-
gaged in gold-mining, before
coming to Prince Rupert some
30 years ago. He had followed
stevedoring here.

Deceased, who would have
been 69 years of age tomorrow,
was born in Quebec. Besides his
son, George, there is a younger
son, Earl Brochu, who is on
service with the Canadian Army
in Italy. A married daughter,
Lorraine, lives in Vancouver.

The funeral will take place in
Vancouver on Monday after-
noon.

Many old friends will leave
with regret of Mr. Brochu's pass-
ing.
