Waterfront Whiffs

Stormy Weather Holds Up Fishing Experimental Herring Run at New Plant — Capt. R. Gammon Here

Due in part at least to continuing stormy weather, fishing operations in Prince Rupert district are still practically at a standstill. As soon as conditions ameliorate, some vessels will be heading out for cod and dogfish. Meantime Kwaksha Pass off Cape Calvert, just north of Queen Charlotte Sound, is still the nearest point at which herring are running in commercial quantities. The B.C. Packers is feeding its canning plant at Alert Bay from there while Kwaksha is also supplying fish for the Namu and Port Edward reduction plant. A few have found their way to the Millard canning plant on the Prince Rupert waterfront.

Nelson Bros. Ltd. new cannery at Port Edward ran herring for the first time Friday when a few fish from Kwaksha were put through for the purpose of trying out the machinery. Reports are that everything functioned satisfactorily.
