Silverleaf Lard

There was a time not so very long ago, when there seemed to be a real risk that we in Canada might find ourselves short of cooking fats. Fortunately, the efforts of Canadian farmers have averted that danger and now there is no reason why every kitchen in Canada should not be supplied with a pound or two of that wonderful standby, Silverleaf Lard.

RHUBARB PIE

11/2 cups sifted 1/2 tsp. baking powder pastry flour 7 thsps. chilled 1 tsp. salt Silverleaf Lard Ice cold water

Mix and sift into a bowl the flour, salt and baking powder. Cut half of lard into these dry ingredients, to the size of wheat grains-then cut in remainder of lard, to the size of small peas. Sprinkle with cold water, and mix with a fork, adding enough water to make a dough which will just form a mass that cleans easily from the bowl. Chill,

FOR THE FILLINGS 5 cups 1/2-inch 6 thsps. flour

11/2 cups sugar pieces of 1 thsp. butter Prepare the rhubarb. Add combined flour and sugar. Turn mixture into a deep pie dish (the sides may be lined with rolled-out pie-paste, if desired) dor with butter. Moisten edges of dish. Roll out paste, slit for escape of steam, and place over the rhubart Trim and crimp edges. Bake in a hot oven, 450 degrees, for 12 minutes, then reduce heat to moderately hot, 375 degrees, and bake until thubarb is tender and crust baked and nicely browned. Note: A support may be placed in the centre of the pie dish before turning in the filling.

If you have a special allowance, you must also affix your special category windshield sticker at once, regardless of whether you are using the special ration book to purchase gasoline.
