### DESTROY SS UNIT

LONDON-German 12th SS Panzer division has been completely destroyed, according to an army announcement. This was the division that murdered 19 Canadian soldiers at Caen early in the Normandy campaign.

JEOPARDIZE NAZIS

ROME-In a major move on the Southern French front, Americans have struck inland 140 miles to capture the town of Grenoble. It is predicted at headquarters that this move will force the Germans to withdraw from Southeastern France.

Here are two emblems worn by some soldiers of the Canadian Army Overseas, which World War II has produced and made famous. Below is pictured the shoulder sleeve insignia worn by personnel attached to SHAEF-Supreme Headquarters Allied Expeditionary Force-in other words General Eisenhower's staff. The shield is black with red flames rising from a white sword, and a rainbow which indicates all colors of which national flags of the Allies are composed tops the shield. At top is the insignia of the famous British Eighth Army—a gold or yellow Crusader's cross on a white shield. Canadians fighting with the 8th wear this insignia.
