KISPIOX, April 4 — This interior community turned out last Wednesday to attend the funeral of Sadie Olive Johnson, 15-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Silas Johnson. The funeral was held from Kispiox United Church with Rev. A. Rutherford officiating.

The girls of the congregation sang the hymn "When He Cometh" and, carrying floral tributes, led the funeral procession to the grave.

Deceased became a member of Kispiox United Church at Easter two years ago and at the time of her death was secretary of the Sunday School. She was also an active member of the church choir and the C.G.I.T.

Rev. Mr. Rutherford spoke briefly on the subject "A Blessed Assurance" and took for his text a verse from the book of Samuel: "I shall go to Him but He shall not return to me."

Following the burial ceremony the congregation gathered at the graveside and sang old familiar hymns, closing with "What a Friend We Have in Jesus." William Wale of Hazelton offered the closing prayer.

Chief mourners were the parents of the deceased and her three sisters, Peggy, Clara and Mrs. Ray Wilson.
