LOCAL BOY IS ILL IN ITALY
 Capt. Arthur James Stewart of R.C.A.M.C. Stricken with Infection

Capt. Arthur James Stewart, Royal Canadian Army Medical Corps, son of Mr. and Mrs. D. G. Stewart, formerly of Prince Rupert and now of Vancouver, and himself born in Prince Rupert, has been seriously ill in Italy since January 3 with a streptococcus infection but is now improving.

With the B. C. Dragoons, he went overseas in October, 1941, and transferred to the 7th Light Field Ambulance. Later he was at 5th Division headquarters in Italy, where he has served for one and a half years.

He went to school in Prince Rupert and after graduating in Arts from U.B.C., where he was affiliated with Phi Delta Theta, he graduated from McGill University with his medical degree in 1938. He interned at Vancouver General Hospital for two years prior to enlisting.

16th Century Dish Is Prized Heirloom
 EDMONTON, Feb. 27 (C)—A Venetian glass pickle dish 439 years old and said to be the only one of its kind in Canada is one of the proud possessions of Mrs. E. Murray of Edmonton. An heirloom handed down in the family from mother to daughter through many generations, it came to her 40 years ago and originally came from one of the family in Switzerland.
