ique of the young people would be ensured. "Nothing that has been done along these lines in Russia cannot be done here but we must have leadership."

Mr. Mickleburgh promised that at no time would he ever allow the considerations of party to be placed above the needs of the people whom he represented.

The L.P.P. candidate declared his complete respect for William Brett but regretted that Harry Archibald should have made a slanderous and completely untruthful attack upon the L.P.P. "We are stronger than ever new, however, because of the rancor of a man who cannot stomach another Labor party." Mickleburgh charged Archibald with complete falsification when he asserted the C.C.F. had been the only party to take up at Ottawa the Windsor strike. Indeed not only the lone L.P.P. members but also the Liberals and Conservatives had taken this up. "This strike is far more than a political issue,"

Mickleburgh declared the policies and platforms of both coalition and C.C.F. were bankrupt as far as meeting the immediate needs of the people was concerned.
