The veteran first-base slugger of Cincinnati Reds—Frank "Buck" McCormick—has been sold to the Philadelphia Phillies. The transaction was completed Monday at the meeting of the major league representatives in Chicago. The Phillies are laying on the line \$30,000 plus one player yet to be named for the services of McCormick, who was chosen the National League's most valuable player in 1940. Meantime, the big league officials have decided to delay until today a decision on the Pacific Coast League's plea to become a major circuit. In other Chicago deals, the Hollywood Cubs of the Pacific Coast League bought Second Baseman Woody Williams from the Cincinnati club and Catcher Stan Andrews and Pitcher Jim Estock from the Phillies. Williams has been with the Reds for the last three years.

Winnipeg the Brandon Elks routed the St. James Orioles, 14-4, in a Manitoba Junior "A" Hockey Association game. But the club was suspended by the Manitoba Amateur Hockey Association. President Jimmy Dunn said the suspension will remain in force until such time as the Brown Elks hockey club executive sees fit to abide by the rules of the constitution and the decisions of the M.A.H.A. The suspension came after the Elks used Bill Johnson and Hector Bourgeois in the first period of the game. Brandon's application for transfers for the players had been refused and they were ordered to return to the Winnipeg Rangers and the Orioles, respectively. In the Ontario Hockey League senior "A" circuit Monday night, Hamilton Patricia defeated Owen Sound, 7-4. In the junior "A" series,

Mariboros trounced Barrie, 6-1, and Toronto Young Rangers defeated Hamilton Lloyds, 5-3.

The Manitoba schoolboy football champions, St. Paul's College, have received an invitation to meet a team from Vancouver College in Vancouver on January 1. This may be the start of a Canadian New Year's Day bowl game, now common in the United States. If the game comes off as scheduled, it will be the first match of its kind in Canada.

The U.S.A. Sports Federation—formerly the American Olympic Association—has changed its name again. Now it is the United States Olympic Association. With the name change came a revamping of its list of officers. Avery Bundage was re-elected president, but new men were named to other posts.
