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SMITHERS "V-E DAY"

Was Celebrated Quietly—
Stores Closed Three Days—
Impromptu Gatherings

SMITHERS, May 11—V-E Day at Smithers was celebrated in a quiet and orderly manner. Early Monday morning radio announcements that the end of the war had come were heard by many but until nearly noon people just stood around commenting on the situation and hoping that it was true. At 11 a.m. the steam whistle and the siren of the C.N.R. roundhouse started blowing long and short blasts and continued doing so until steam was exhausted and, this being the awaited signal, the stores closed immediately and the schools also were dismissed for the day.

There being no brass band and no military forces available for an impromptu parade the next best way of celebrating was organized and the Canadian Legion made plans for a patriotic concert Monday evening in the Reo Theatre. The result was that the theatre was filled at 8:15 and a concert of community singing, vocal solos, and recitations, interspersed with a number of very short speeches, made quite an enjoyable evening and gave the community a place to gather to express satisfaction and relief in knowing that the European part of the war had come to a successful conclusion. Walter Bodger's Orchestra provided music for the evening.

After the concert several parades headed by accordions and bagpipes wandered through the streets for a time.

The various churches of the town held services on Tuesday morning at 11 o'clock and these were all well attended.

Tuesday evening there was a quiet but happy dance in the Smithers Hall for which Goodacre's Orchestra provided the music.

The local stores remained closed from Monday morning until Thursday morning which left a number of unsuspecting residents quite short on rations for a day or so.

Also, those patrons of the liquor store who were afraid to trust themselves to be able to obtain and hold their liquor ration ahead of time for the celebration of the end of hostilities, found that they had to do their celebrating without any extra encouragement for the liquor store was promptly closed upon the official receipt of news of the end of the war.

Flags were flown from every flagstaff and in streamers across Main St. and many windows and homes were decorated with bunting.

The only deterrent to an all

out feeling of relief and gratitude that hostilities had ceased was the knowledge that the war in the Pacific was still to be fought to a finish but it was the hope of everyone that the Japanese government would realize what the cost of prolonging the war had meant to Germany and bring their war to a speedy end with unconditional surrender before their country had been devastated to the same or worst extent.

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GARDEN NOTEBOOK

A LOT FROM A LITTLE

Those unfamiliar with gardening are amazed at the amount of vegetables a plot a few yards square can produce. Handied properly a piece of ground 12 feet wide and 25 feet long should yield practically all the vegetables, except potatoes, a small family will require from early July until frost.

For ease in cultivation, rows should run across the width, not the length of the plot, and they can be as close together as 12 inches for little, narrow and early stuff like lettuce, radish and carrots, about 15 inches for beets and beans, and 18 inches for corn and tomatoes. To save room and induce early and clean fruits the latter should be staked with all side branches pinched off.

Space can be saved by alternating early vegetables like radish, spinach and lettuce with later maturing sorts like beets, carrots and onions. By the time the second group really require all room the first will have been removed and eaten.

Pest Control

For almost every flower, vegetable, shrub or vine there is a special bug or disease which if unchecked may make life miserable for the gardener, as well as the garden. Scab and rot may attack potatoes, dirty black spots appear on green beans, a borer runs through carrots, mildew ruins rose foliage, thrips prevent gladioli from blooming, a tiny insect stunt dahlias buds.

It is impossible and unneces-

sary to go into details. Actually all these pests can be controlled fairly easily and there are combination sprays and dusts which will cope with most situations. One point, however, is most important and that is that well cultivated, well managed gardens are far less susceptible to attack than those that have been neglected.
