Before the strike ended today, upwards of 10,000 Canadian meat-packing employees had become idle. The latest additions to the walk-out list had been at Winnipeg, Regina, Saskatoon, Prince Albert and Moose Jaw-some 25000 in all.

This morning the big meat packing plant of the Swift-Canadian Co. was to have become strike-bound as a result of a strike vote by the plant's employees Wednesday night but the settlement today obviated this walk-out.
