

## BRITAIN HAS WORST FOG IN YEARS— ★ ★ ★ ★ ★ BRINGS DEATH, CRIPPLES TRANSPORT

LONDON (CP)—Britain's worst fog since 1925, complicated by freezing conditions, brought death today to at least four children and three adults and crippled year-end transport throughout most of the country.

Firemen, groping through the dense mist over slippery roads, arrived too late to save children who were burned to death in the home of their parents in Sheffield.

Collision of two London suburban trains at Northwood Hill killed two men and one woman.





**LONDON** (P)—Nearly 30,000 couples in England and Wales have been divorced since January, 1945.


