City of Prince Rupert TENDER

Sealed Tenders, addressed to the undersigned and marked "Tender for Pioneers' Home" will be received until noon, April 20th, 1945, for the construction of a Pioneers' Home at Prince Rupert, B.C.

Plans and Specifications can be seen and form of Tender obtained at the office of the City Clerk, Prince Rupert, B.C., and at the office of the B.C. Journal of Commerce, Vancouver, B.C.

Tenders will not be considered unless made on the forms supplied by the City and in accordance with the conditions set forth therein.

Each tender must be accompanied by a certified cheque on a chartered bank in Canada payable to the Municipal Treasurer, Prince Rupert, equal to ten percent of the amount of the tender, or beary bonds of the Dominion of Canada will be accepted in lieu of or in conjunction with certified cheque. The sum so deposited will be forfeited if the party tendering declines to enter into contract on the form provided. The deposit will be returned to the respective parties whose tenders are not accepted. Any tender not accompanied by a security deposit as described will not be considered.

The City, through the City Clerk's office, will supply blueprints and specifications of the work on deposit of a sum of ten dollars (\$10.00), which deposit will be released on return of the blueprints and specifications within a month from the date of reception of tenders. If not returned within that period the deposit will be forfeited.

The City does not bind itself to accept the lowest or any tender.


