After spending five years, billions of dollars and thousands of lives in destroying dictatorship abroad, we are actually coddling, if not cultivating the same seeds of one-man power right here in Canada.

So remember this: Your vote in this election is tremendously important. It will help decide an issue that ranks second only to victory in the war. The verdict will effect the life and future of every man, woman and child in Canada. Hence, before you decide who to vote for, you should post yourself on just what State Socialism stands for -and what the ultimate consequences will be to you and yours.

# Good-bye Freedom!

Briefly the Socialists propose that we turn over to the C.C.F. politicians not merely the running of our government, but complete and permanent control of our everyday lives. That's what "State Socialism" means.


