TOKYO, Sept. 13 (P)—Prince Fumimaro Konaye, Japanese vice-premier, declared he had tried in the summer of 1941 to meet President Franklin D. Roosevelt and avert war but his proposal failed, partly through militarist opposition and partly because the Japanese government was regarded internationally as a liar.
