

MIDGET SUBS CAUSED PLENTY OF TROUBLE FOR JAPS-New pictures, just released, tell the story of the part played by Britain's midget submarines in the British navy's war against Japan. The subs, varying in length from 30 to 50 feet, with crews of three to four, unable to travel more than 10 to 12 feet below the surface, they arrived in far eastern waters with an enviable European war record that included the striking and crippling of the German battleship Tirpitz (later sunk by the R.A.F.).
