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The Final Phase . . .

Highlighted by the American First Army epic crossing of the Rhine for the first time since Napoleonic days, greatest victories of the war are now taking shape and the end of the battle

of Europe may come in a matter of days.

The present pattern resembles that of the battle of Normandy last summer, when the United Kingdom—Canadian forces in the Caen sector wore down the bulk of the German hard-hitting reserve and created the conditions for the American breakthrough and encirclement of the Falaise pocket, and so mauled three German Armies that they were driven back in confusion across the Seine.

Present developments, taken against the background of achievement of the Western Allies since June 6 last, represent a powerful decisive blow at what remains of German military resources.
