TODAY'S MENDING HINT

Reinforce underwear at the knees and elbows after it has been washed several times or is beginning to show signs of wear. Put a small piece of cotton behind the buttons as reinforcement.

A plain weave, hand darn is the best way to mend most small tears in wool material. For a large hole, use a darned-in patch or an inset patch. The darned-in patch is better for thick wools, the inset patch for thinner ones.
