## V-BOMBS WERE BANE OF LOCAL ARMY VETERAN

Capt. Robert F. Orme of Prince Rupert developed a healthy respect for the German V-bomb during his four years overseas with the Royal Canadian Army Service Corps.

The Prince Rupert soldier, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Orme, Fourth Avenue West, was one of the men who helped supply Canadian combat soldiers as they slugged their way across France, Belgium, Holland and Germany. It was in Belgium that he made the acquaintance of the Nazi's vengeance weapon.

Arriving Monday on the Princess Adelaide from Vancouver, to which city he travelled after leaving the troopship Louis Pasteur at Halifax, Capt. Orme saw his home town for the first time since he went overseas with the Third Division in 1941. He is on a 30-day leave after which he will report back to Vancouver, possibly for discharge.

Capt. Orme respects the V-bomb because he knows first hand what it can do. In Belgium he said one landed in a downtown district of a city, killing 700 people in the crowded thoroughfare. Although more than a block away, Capt. Orme sustained a dislocated shoulder from the explosion. Concussion from the blast knocked the floor from under him as he stood in an office building and he was injured in an effort to prevent himself falling through the wreckage.

As well as being a horror instrument for civilians, the rocket bombs had a military value as well, Capt. Orme can attest. A petrol dump which Service Corps troops had laboriously concentrated was the

centre of a V-bomb hit. It destroyed 160,000 gallons of gasoline. "It was a heartbreaker," Capt. Orme recalled ruefully. "We needed the gas badly. At that time our units were using up 100,000 gallons of petrol a day." But in spite of V-bombs, it was the combat soldiers at the front who really had the dangers and hardships, Capt. Orme said.
