

"Conscription" Dead Issue . . .

The "conscription issue," evidently, did not bear great weight in the election campaign as far as the service men themselves were concerned as evidenced by the marked minority of the service vote which the Progressive-Conservatives, great critics of the government manpower policy, received. Even here in Skeena, where we had a popular overseas soldier as the Progressive-Conservative candidate, that party was accorded a mere twenty-one percent of the total service vote.

The proof of the pudding, after all, is in the eating and the policy of voluntary enlistment for overseas, while it might have had a narrow squeak and might not have been popular with a lot of us, did work out. To discuss what might or might not have happened had circumstances been different than they were is not worth the further time or effort. The whole thing is a dead issue.


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


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
