

#### SURRENDER PACT COPIES GIVEN CITY SCHOOLS

Copies of the unconditional surrender documents signed by German and Japanese war lords in the presence of conquering Allied leaders have been presented to all five of the city's schools by the local War Finance Committee and will form part of the school's libraries for the interest and instruction of the children.

The presentations were made yesterday afternoon by Lloyd Morris, publicity director of the local War Finance committee, as part of the Ninth Victory Loan campaign. The documents, totalling 20 pages each, were received by the principals of the schools.

Each of the documents contains facsimile reproductions of the signatures of the men who brought World War II to a close. They were received, and will be preserved as having highly historic value.


