BOWLING ALLEY IS RELINQUISHED

U.S.O. Finished with Resort Here Which Was Popular During War Years  
After more than two years operation as a service club, the U.S.O. bowling alley was officially closed Sunday night, it was announced yesterday by Frank E. Finnerty, U.S.O. director. The alleys are being returned to the owner, Douglas Frizzell. They were completely renovated only last August. Many structural and ornamental changes were made including fluorescent lighting and new built-in pits.  
When the bowling alley opened under U.S.O. direction on June 1, 1943, until last night, 110,000 bowlers and 135,000 spectators, or a total of 245,000 American and Canadian servicemen and women, visited this U.S.O. Club No. 2.

During the alley's operation, leagues were carried on constantly for all branches of the Allied services stationed in the Prince Rupert area. Many friendships were developed through these leagues. Finnerty said, and the bowling alley was truly another "House of Good Neighbors."  
Operated by the U.S.O. as a separate club staffed by Army personnel, the bowling alley did not diminish from the general U.S.O. activities at the main club building but acted as a supplemental program for the men and women during their leisure hours, Finnerty said. Sgt. Walt Montgomery was the manager, assisted by Sgt. Edward Brodock. Private First Class Harry Kent was in charge of maintenance.  
As yet no announcement has been made as to when the bowling alley will be opened for the general public.

Detroit Favored In World Series

DETROIT, Oct. 2.—The World Series opens Wednesday in Detroit and already the Tigers have been established as favorites to take the Chicago Cubs. Betting Commissioner James J. Carroll has announced that a bettor favoring Detroit would have to lay \$13 to net \$10. However, a bettor favoring Chicago Cubs could get a net return of \$11 on a \$10 risk.  
The Tigers will star their left-handed ace—Hal Newhouser—on the mound. He has won twenty-five games for Detroit this season including Sunday's pennant clincher at St. Louis. Manager Charlie Grimm's opening choice for the Chicago Cubs is expected to be Borowy, who was bought from the Yanks a few months ago for a reputed \$100,000.
