JUNE WEATHER IN TERRACE IS QUITE AVERAGE

TERRACE, July 5 - Brilliant weather came to Terrace this Monday after two or three weeks of cool showery conditions.

A cursory glance through the records of weather for the month of June during the thirty years since 1915 when records were first started at Terrace shows nothing unusual. Yet everyone talks as though the month just passed must have been the wettest and coolest ever. The average temperature for June 1945, was 59. The record shows this to be very average indeed. The hottest June came in 1936, the year of the destructive flood, with an average of 62. The coolest June was in 1933 with an average of 55. LEGION MEETING

The record of precipitation, too, shows the month to have been quite undistinguished. Many have been saying it must have broken all records for rain. Yet June brought only 2.39 inches. The wettest June was in 1918 with 4-21 inches. The driest came with 1922 with only precise .12 of an inch was recorded in that month.
