Two-token value for Thursday is half a pound of hamburger for meat patties. Unrationed fish is a foregone conclusion for Friday. Being tokenless on Saturday is no cause for frenzy, for unrationed meats offer a variety of choice. A pickled tongue gently simmered and served hot with a taste-tantalizing and seasonable cranberry sauce can be a happy highlight in the week's eating. And it will also start you on another week by providing a Sunday meal.
