

Side-Tracking Prince Rupert

The bare-faced proposal of the Canadian National Railways to reduce the coastal end of its northern line from Jasper to Prince Rupert to the status of the lowest form of a branch line by cutting the service to three mixed trains a week in either direction is worthy of the strongest protest. It is poor treatment for a line which, during the war boom, provided the system with traffic at times exceeding that of the Vancouver line.

We had thought that the railway would not revert to the old policy of cutting down to the very minimum to carry the traffic of the moment but would, instead, maintain at least a respectable service and the facilities to encourage rather than discourage traffic. While it is to be realized that two wrongs do not make a right and that it would not be helping Prince Rupert any to drag the Vancouver service down to the level that it has been suggested might be Prince Rupert's lot, we wonder if the company has any intention to cut the southern line from Jasper to the coast, which now enjoys two crack trains a day in either direction, to meet the minimum of a reduced traffic there as well.

There is also inconsistency in the move of the government-owned railway to reduce employment of its U.S. GOODS personnel at a time like this when U.S. GOODS the government itself is urging all TO AFRICA businesses and industries to maintain employment at the highest possible level. It is not much of an example for private businesses and services nor is it much of an encouragement for interests which are trying to assume their responsibility in keeping up employment at this critical time.
