### Briefs From Britain

**Wootton Creek, Isle of Wight.**—A camp called "Little Canada" was built here just before the war and requisitioned by the War Office. Now the log cabins grouped around a sea water swimming pool will soon be available to the public.

**LONDON.**—A coroner's jury decided Francis Barber Lumb, D.C.M., 72, died from enemy action—from wounds suffered 45 years ago at the relief of Ladysmith in the Boer War.

**HASTINGS, Eng.**—A gigantic national holiday centre half a mile long, including the largest single holiday building in the world and costing a total of \$18,000,000 is proposed for this seaside town.

**LONDON.**—A new oil painting of the King by L. Carr Cox is on display here and later will be placed in the N.A.A.F.I. club in the Naples Royal Palace.

**CARDIFF, Wales.**—Captain Lionel Lindsay, chief constable of Glamorganshire for 45 years until his retirement in 1936, has died here, aged 84. He was a descendant of a noted Irish family in Dublin.

**LONDON.**—The first woman students to work in St. Mary's and Guy's Medical Schools are not permitted to work alongside the men for they have their own teachers and their own curriculum.

**RAMSEY, Isle of Man.**—A \$1,350,000 plan has been drafted for construction of a brine spa here which may make the Isle of Man the centre for treatment of rheumatism and similar complaints.

**LONDON.**—Edward Pope, London manager of the Bank of Montreal, has been appointed president of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce in Great Britain. W. A. McAdam, British Columbia's agent-general, is the vice-president.

### FIRE LOSS LESS HERE THIS YEAR

There have been fewer fire alarms but more loss from fire in Prince Rupert so far this year than the corresponding period last year. Up to the end of April this year there had been 26 calls as compared with 44 in the first four months of 1944. The fire damage this year to date has been estimated at \$27,000 compared with \$39,000 in the first four months of 1944. In April this year there was but one alarm with no damage whereas in April 1944 there were twelve fire calls with \$3200 damage.

### DOWDY GARB IRKS NURSES

**Dress Specialist Asked to Design Neater and More Attractive Uniforms**

**LONDON, May 25.**—British nurses are up in arms. They want a new and smarter walking out uniform. They are tired, they say, of looking dowdy and having the show always stolen by Red Cross nurses in their more attractive clothes. The nurses' complaint was discussed at a recent Trades Union Congress meeting and the Tailors and Garment Workers have been asked to find a dress specialist who will design a new uniform. What the nurses want, said a member of the Nurses Guild, is a uniform similar to that already

### being worn by nurses in Middlesex County Council hospitals—a close fitting tailored double-breasted white overall. Sisters in charge of wards in the Middlesex hospitals wear a short, smartly-cut blue shoulder cape over their white uniforms. For outdoor wear the nurses consider a grey coat with red markings, worn by the Civil Nursing Reserve, is the smartest. A grey peaked cap is worn with these coats. There is not a great deal of difference between the working uniform of the hospital nurse and the Red Cross nurse except for the big Red Cross which the latter wear on their white aprons. But besides the Red Cross there are a variety of different uniforms as the color of the stripes in the nurses' overalls varies according to the hospital they are attached to. In some hospitals they wear caps while in others they wear the veil headress. Some of the bigger hospitals provide their nurses with their own style of outdoor uniform such as a small poke-bonnet and cape, but the state registered nurses are given only a plain navy blue serge coat and cap and are the "Cinderellas." Besides a neater, smarter uniform the nurses hope to obtain a standardization of uniform so there won't be varying styles and so the public will be able to distinguish between those who have worked for years to qualify and those who are only part-time nurses.
