Prince Rupert's exceptionally quiet and orderly celebration of victory in Europe included an impromptu midnight procession on Monday when a hundred or so soldiers, sailors and civilians, led by a piper and a drummer, marched and sang their way in happy and well self-regulated parade around the rectangle bounded by McBride St., Third Ave., Fulton St. and Sixth Ave. This spontaneous demonstration was about the only nocturnal event.

There was nothing whatever to mar the night, the police said. In fact, it was quieter than many a pay day night. Possibly the fact that the liquor store and beer parlors had been closed throughout the day and the bootleggers had "run dry" may have had something to do with it.
