

India's New Deal . . .

The British government has gone further on the way towards according self-government to India. The All Indian Congress is given greater concessions. Through the retention of the viceroyship and milicary command-in-chief, the British government is still in the driver's seat. As already said, the changed policy represents a measure of new deal for India. Whether or not it will go far in resolving the fundamental difficulties in the Commonwealth's most enigmatic constituent is somehing that is still left very much in doubt. But certainly officers should take care to set a right example for the enlistted personnel.




