

MUST BUILD ON FREEDOM

Making Life Worthwhile Is
Only Worthwhile Thing—
Padre Durnford

"The only worthwhile thing in life is to make your life worthwhile," asserted Major R. C. H. Durnford, visiting padre of the Seaforth Highlanders, in conducting a drumhead service for the personnel of Prince Rupert Machine Gun Regiment and the local Sea Cadet Corps at the YMCA war services auditorium Sunday afternoon. "And there is nobody but you who can make your own life worthwhile. Almighty God has a job for you to do and has given you the raw material with which he expects you to do something."

Padre Durnford warned against the assumption by a person that he did not count. "That is just an alibi for doing nothing," declared the padre. "God Almighty never had time to make nobody."

"The war may be over but we must still fight for freedom," continued Major Durnford. The boys who died over there fought to give us the chance to build a new civilization founded in freedom. It is up to us to build on their sacrifice of blood."

Failures and reverses might come but one should never be put off by them. No greater

inspiration could be had than that of England itself which had struggled on to glorious victory from a position of seemingly hopeless and utter calamity.

Remember nothing worthwhile was ever obtained without trying. There is nothing easy or cheap about a life that counts in the sight of God. You can get anything you want if you want it badly enough. If you have a high sense of aim and direction and the will to do it, there is nothing that can stay your progress."

Major Durnford was assisted in the service by Capt. H. W. Kerley, local area padre. Music was by the band of the Prince Rupert Machine Gun Regiment under direction of Sgt. Peter Lien. The hymns were "All People That On Earth Do Dwell," "O God Our Help in Ages Past" and "Onward Christian Soldiers."

Following the service, there was a public reception at the Armory to give friends the opportunity to meet Major Durnford.

The Regiment paraded to the service under command of Capt. J. H. Engleke in the absence of the commanding officer, Major C. J. C. Toombs, and the Sea Cadets under Lieut.-Commander Alex Mitchell.

COAST ARTIST EXHIBITS HERE

First Major Showing of Its
Kind Being Made at
Prince Rupert

What is probably the first major art exhibit ever held in Prince Rupert is opening tonight with the display of more than 30 oil portraits and landscapes by Mrs. Jean Ness Findlay, B. C. artist whose work has been acclaimed throughout the Dominion. The display is being held in the common lounge of the Y.M.C.A. centre.

Resident in Prince Rupert last June, Mrs. Findlay did most of her exhibited work at Hartley Bay where for 10 years she and

her husband were the only white people. Her work contains many thoughtful character studies of coast natives, as well as some striking landscapes and other coast scenes.

However, there is much of local interest in the show. A feature of it is a pastel portrait of the late R. L. McIntosh loaned for exhibit by Mrs. McIntosh. There are pastel portraits also of Mrs. Elizabeth Buchanan, mother of Mrs. Robert Cameron, who recently celebrated her 87th birthday and portraits of Marilyn and Wendy Armstrong, daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Alex Armstrong, and of Lynn Galbraith, young son of Dr. and Mrs. J. D. Galbraith.

Perhaps one of the most striking pictures of the exhibit is one bearing the title "Indian Sum-

mer," a vivid canvas of blue, green and yellow showing a robust Indian girl rowing a boat.

"Old Prospector at Home" is a lifelike portrait of the late Peter Long, Hartley Bay prospector, relaxing in a rocking chair.

Mrs. Findlay was born in Montreal and studied art at the Ecole des Beaux Arts there, at Columbia University and at the Rockport Summer School of Art, Rockport, Massachusetts. She has exhibited in the Art Association of Montreal and at the Vancouver Art Gallery, two successful "one man" shows, the first in 1943 and the second last May.


