ELECTRIC "TIN FISH" STOWED ON SUB-The crew of a submarine re-provisioning at an advanced base in the Pacific. stow an electric torpedo below decks. These electrically-driven weapons, a carefully guarded secret during the war years, now are revealed by the navy to have accounted for over 1,000,000 tons of enemy shipping. The torpedoes are driven by electric motors powered by specially designed lead acid type storage batteries, and are gyroscope-controlled. They leave no tell-tale wake behind them as the conventional steam-turbine driven torpedoes do. Over 20 feet long, they weigh about a ton and a half.
