PARIS, Aug. 2 (P)—Ladies day at the Auteuil races used to be a fashion day, when a bevy of beautifully dressed models were sent out by coutouriers to show off their summer collections. ALOST, Belgium, Aug. 2 (P)—Important work is being done here by the girls of the Canadian Women's Army Corps in the Casualty and Effects Section of the Canadian Section 2nd Echelon, 21st Army Group. This is where detailed administrative checking keeps track of soldiers who become casualties and their belongings. Emphasis on work of the section came during periods of heavy fighting when the speed with which military headquarters in London and relatives at home were told of casualties depended largely on the speed and accuracy of these girls.
