Dalton of Toronto tied the score. The break came in the last few seconds when Cpl. J. Gold, Nanaimo, B.C., slammed in the winning tally.

Other members of the winning team included Pte. P. Burns, Hamilton, Ont.; Lieut. K. G. Jones, Vancouver; Sgt. Tantrum, Cumberland, B.C.; and Cpl. D. Moyies, Winnipeg. Among the losers were Sgt. S. S.
