LABOR and ELECTIONS

This nation's largest labor orgnization, the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada, has thrown its support behind the return of the King Government. In a letter recently released for publication, its Political Action Committee, without mentioning the name of the party, strongly advised the 350,000 members of its various unions to vote and work for re-election of the present administration.

The unions which make up the Trades and Labor Congress are affiliated with the American Federation of Labor. The letter, signed by the Political Action Committee chairman, Ernest Ingles, London, Ont., impliedly declares that the King Government can be trusted to implement its election pledges and warns against putting inexperienced groups into power at this time.

The letter says, in part, as follows:

"We have now reached the period of return from wartime to peacetime economy. The experience gained in moving from peace to war, will prove of incalculable value in making the transition from war to peace. During the period from peace to war, certain obligations were accepted by the Government as to what will be the procedure when the time arrives to go forward to worthwhile peacetime economy. The value of these pledges is enhanced by the fact that the Administration had the experience of going through the war period, and therefore, they will have a better idea of how to redeem those pledges which they themselves gave.

"We are placed in the position of being called upon to determine who can implement those promises best-those who know the reason for the dislocation, or those who could only guess at the reason, but who are not in the possession of facts and experience.

"Those who made those pledges must be given the opportunity to redeem them. They are charged with that responsibility. They must be given the opportunity of keeping faith with the people and establish a peacetime economy that will ensure a free, full and happy life.

"There is a danger that a new group, put into power at this time, would institute policies that might have no relation whatever to the pledges that an overwhelming number of people of this country have out their faith in."
