TOKYO, Sept. 10 — General Douglas MacArthur issued an order today abolishing Imperial Japanese headquarters as from September 13. MacArthur has also ordered a strict press and radio censorship. Short wave broadcasts from Japanese stations are suspended. American censors will be placed in Japanese newspaper offices and radio stations.

DEAD IN BED

Mary Edith Munro, 25, Found Dead in Bed at Nurses' Home

It is understood that the body will be shipped south to deceased's home in Naramata, Penticton, tonight for burial. Miss Munro had been employed on the nursing staff of the General Hospital since last May. Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. William Munro, live at Naramata where her father is a farmer.
